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Course Objectives

Dr. Paul Siegel developed this course to enable public health and health care professionals to 1) communicate the findings of their research and investigations more effectively, and 2) expedite publication of their manuscripts. After completing this course, you will be able to:

- Identify and describe the basic sections of a scientific article, the purpose and organization of the sections, and the elements that comprise them
- Identify and use the principles of style for writing in public health and epidemiology
- Apply effective approaches to the process of writing and publishing an article in a peer-review journal
- Use effective strategies for dealing with requests of journal editors and reviewers

Course Requirements

1. Textbook

The Elements of Style, Fourth Edition, by William Strunk Jr. and E.B. White

2. E-learning Modules

This course contains e-learning modules, which are HTML files that include audio, video, and short answer questions. The short answer questions are not graded; instead they provide you with opportunities to practice and apply your new writing skills. If you start a module, you may close it and return to finish it later. Because these modules communicate with Blackboard to track your progress, (and depending upon the speed of your Internet connection), they may take a few minutes to load. Please feel free to work ahead if time allows!

3. Live WebEx Session: "Title Revisions"

There will be a synchronous online session to revise titles. Each student will submit a title for the class to review and critique. Post your title in a Discussion Board forum named "Titles."

To participate in the session, you need:

- a. Access to a computer/internet connection.
- b. Speakers or headphones.
- c. An internal microphone (most computers have them) or a desktop microphone. You can also use a phone to call-in to the WebEx session.
- d. A link will arrive via email with meeting login information.
