Goals:

- 1.) Define elements of scientific manuscripts and provide good practices for writing.
- 2.) Discuss potential barriers in scientific communication from the perspectives of female faculty role models.
- 3.) Explore recent developments in publication practices from a perspective of an editor-in-chief.
- 4.) Learn uses of social media in science, and acquire guidance on promoting scientific results to potential policy makers, funding agencies, future employers, and the general public.
- 5.) Gain insights on fundamentals of publishing, potential obstacles, and tools for overcoming them during the MD/PhD training years, from the perspective of current student peers.

Objectives: After attending the retreat, MSTP students should be able to do the following:

- 1.) Identify and implement elements of manuscript writing used by successful physician scientists.
- 2.) Have a greater awareness of common barriers in scientific communication and self-promotion and potential strategies to navigate them.
- 3.) Appraise traditional and newer publishing options for scientific work completed during and after the MSTP program.
- 4.) Understand uses of social media for scientists, and can formulate approaches to promote scientific work completed during and after the MSTP program.
- 5.) Assess the experiences of fellow students in publishing and integrate relevant insights/advice into future scientific communication plans.

- <u>Description</u>:
 - Self-promotion is an important component of career advancement, and one mechanism whereby this occurs is through publication. In this session, the panelists will share their



personal advice on navigating relevant challenges/obstacles, which may not be as frequently experienced by male colleagues. However, it is important to note that barriers in scientific communication and self-promotion are universal concepts, and this session offers the opportunity for <u>all students</u> to gain a greater awareness of common challenges and potential strategies to navigate them.
